Staff Report to Planning and Zoning Board

Issue:

UDO Text Amendment: Philip Allen Glaze has submitted a request to amend Section 3.05 of the UDO to allow bars/nightclubs as a permitted use in the Heavy Industrial (I-2) zone.

Background:

On October 18, 2011, Philip Allen Glaze submitted an application to amend Section 3.05 of the UDO to allow bars/nightclubs as a permitted use in the Heavy Industrial (I-2) zone. The applicant recently purchased the vacant building located on Mill Road known as the old "Chicken Box" across from the former Safie Mill site and wants to open a bar/nightclub in the location. However, the property is currently zoned Heavy Industrial (I-2) which does not allow bars/nightclubs. City staff advised the applicant that a request to rezone his recently purchased property to a district (B-3) that would permit a bar/nightclub would constitute spot zoning, which is generally considered illegal. Thus, the applicant has requested the proposed UDO text amendment.

Staff Comments:

1. A copy of the applicable section of the Use Table in Section 3.05 is included in the agenda packet for the Board's review.
2. As set forth in Section 3.05, bars/nightclubs are currently allowed as a permitted use in the Highway Business (B-3) zone and a conditional use in the Central Business (B-2) zone. Such uses are currently prohibited in all other zoning districts.
3. In the opinion of City staff, there are currently adequate areas in the City and extraterritorial jurisdiction appropriately zoned to allow bars/nightclubs without expanding such uses to the I-2 zone. Currently, over nine (9) percent of the City's total jurisdiction is zoned B-3, which as previously stated allows bars and nightclubs as a permitted use.
4. City staff's concern with the requested amendment relates to its possible impact on economic development and more specifically industrial recruitment opportunities. In the opinion of City staff, it is conceivable that a prospective industry could be turned-off from a potential site because of its proximity to a bar/nightclub.

Staff Recommendation:

City staff recommends the Board review the request and recommend the City Council deny the proposed text amendment.

Planning Board Recommendation:

The Planning Board reviewed the request and recommended unanimously the City Council deny the proposed text amendment to allow bars/nightclubs in the Heavy Industrial (I-2) zone.


